Male Enrollment Data for Undergraduate Program by Race/Ethnicity and Gender

2011-2012

The total enrollment for undergraduate nursing students was 201. Males represented 11% (n = 22) of that population and White males accounted for 73% (n = 16) of male nursing students.

2010-2011

The total enrollment for undergraduate nursing students was 236. Males represented 9% (n = 22) of that population and White males accounted for 68% (n = 15) of male nursing students.

2009-2010

The total enrollment for undergraduate nursing students was 299. Males represented 13% (n = 40) of that population and White males accounted for 70% (n = 28) of male nursing students.

Female Enrollment Data for Undergraduate Programs by Race/Ethnicity and Gender

2011-2012

The total enrollment for undergraduate nursing students was 201. Females represented 89% (n =179) of that population and White females accounted for 56% (n = 100) of all female nursing students.

2010-2011

The total enrollment for undergraduate nursing students was 236. Females represented 91% (n = 214) of that population and White females accounted for 53% (n = 114) of all female nursing students.

2009-2010

The total enrollment for undergraduate nursing students was 299. Females represented 87% (n =259) of that population and White females accounted for 51% (n = 133) of all female nursing students.

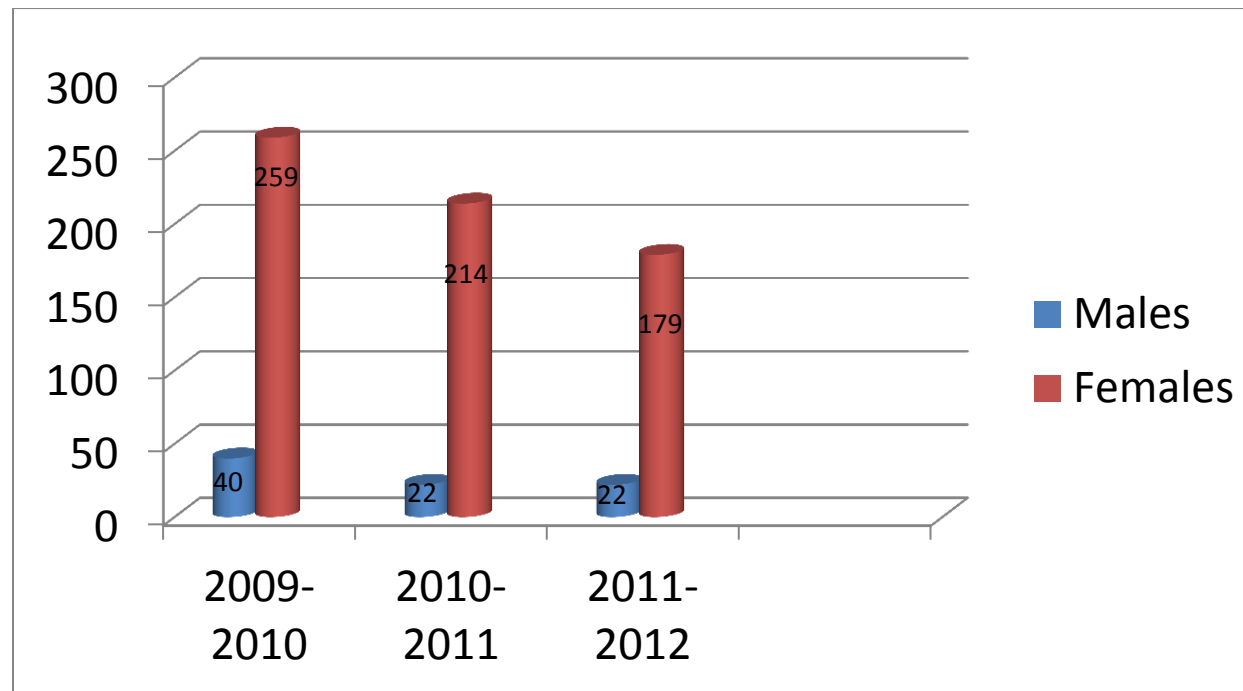

Figure 1: Male to Female Undergraduate Enrollment Comparison

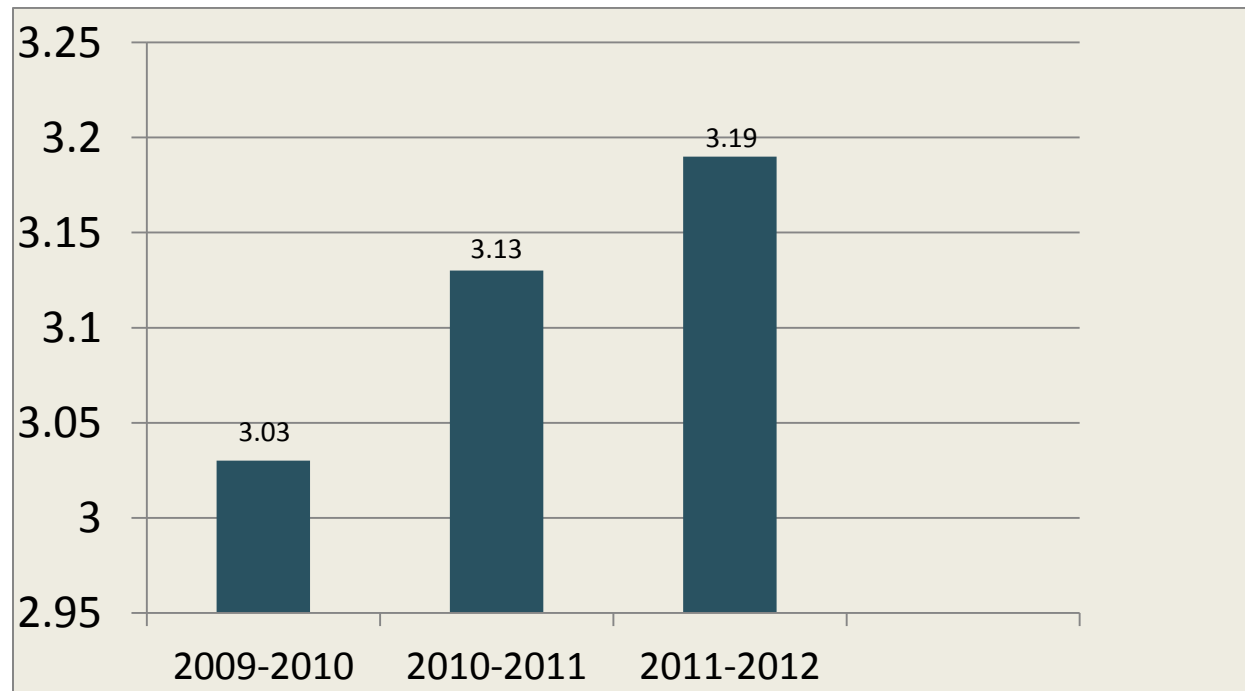

Figure 2: Overall GPA Undergraduate Nursing Students



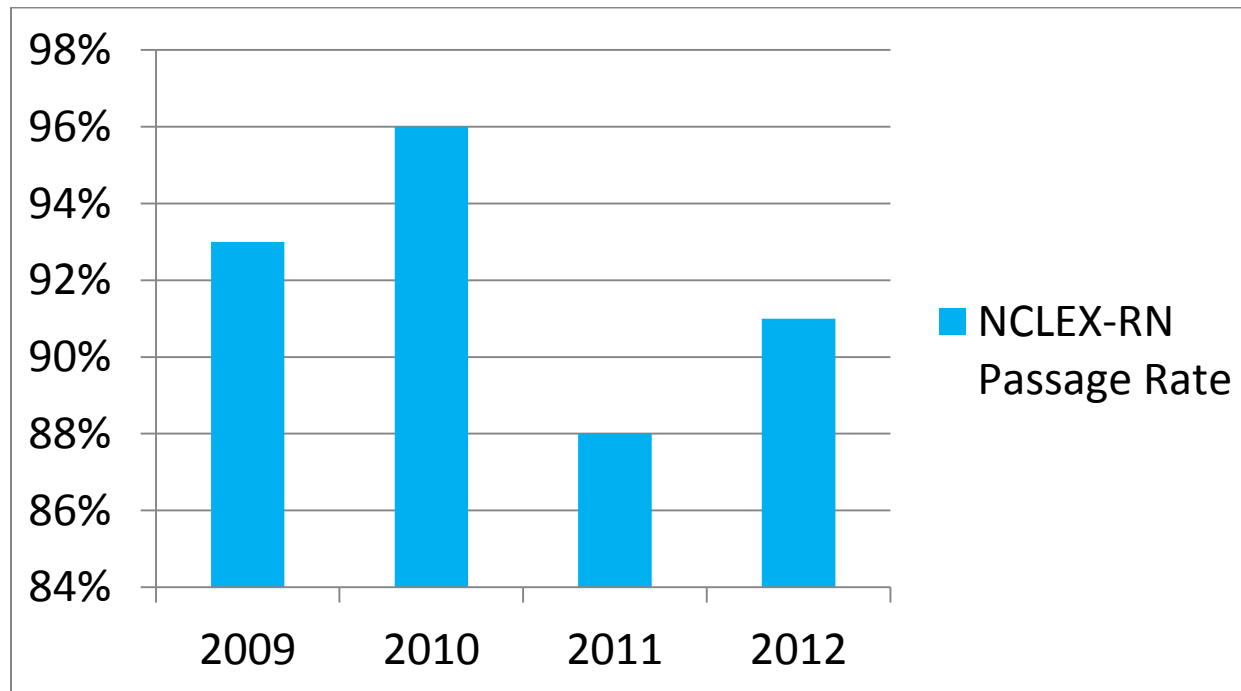

The National Council of State Boards of Nursing is the licensing board for all registered nurses in the United States. All applicants for registered nurse licensure are required to pass the National Council Licensure Examination--RN (NCLEX--RN) upon completion of an accredited program of study in nursing.

The results below provide examination performance of graduates from our School of Nursing who tested for the first time during the 12 month period of data collection. This percentage or passage rate includes both recent and previous graduates who may have waited an extended period of time after graduating to take the exam.

Male Enrollment Data for RN to BSN Program by Race/Ethnicity and Gender

The following data represents RN to BSN data since the initiation of a fully online curriculum.

2011-2012

The total enrollment for RN to BSN students was 84. Males represented 11% (n = 9) of that population and White males accounted for 67% (n = 6) of male nursing students.

2010-2011

The total enrollment for RN to BSN students was 29. Males represented 28% (n = 8) of that population and White males accounted for 88% (n = 7) of male nursing students.

Female Enrollment Data for RN to BSN Program by Race/Ethnicity and Gender

The following data represents RN to BSN data since the initiation of a fully online curriculum.

2011-2012

The total enrollment for RN to BSN students was 84. Females represented 89% (n = 75) of that population and White females accounted for 60% (n = 45) of female RN to BSN nursing students.

2010-2011

The total enrollment for RN to BSN students was 29. Females represented 72% (n = 21) of that population and White females accounted for 67% (n = 14) of female nursing students.

RN to BSN Overall GPA

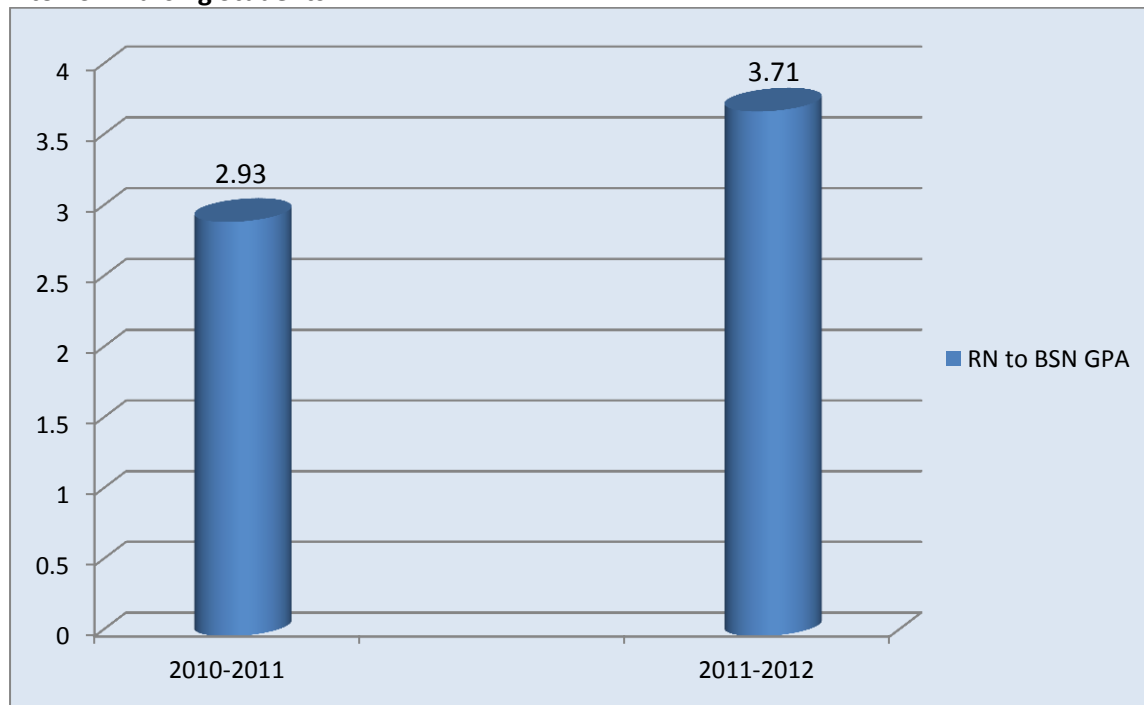
2011-2012

Figure 4: Overall GPA RN to BSN Nursing Students



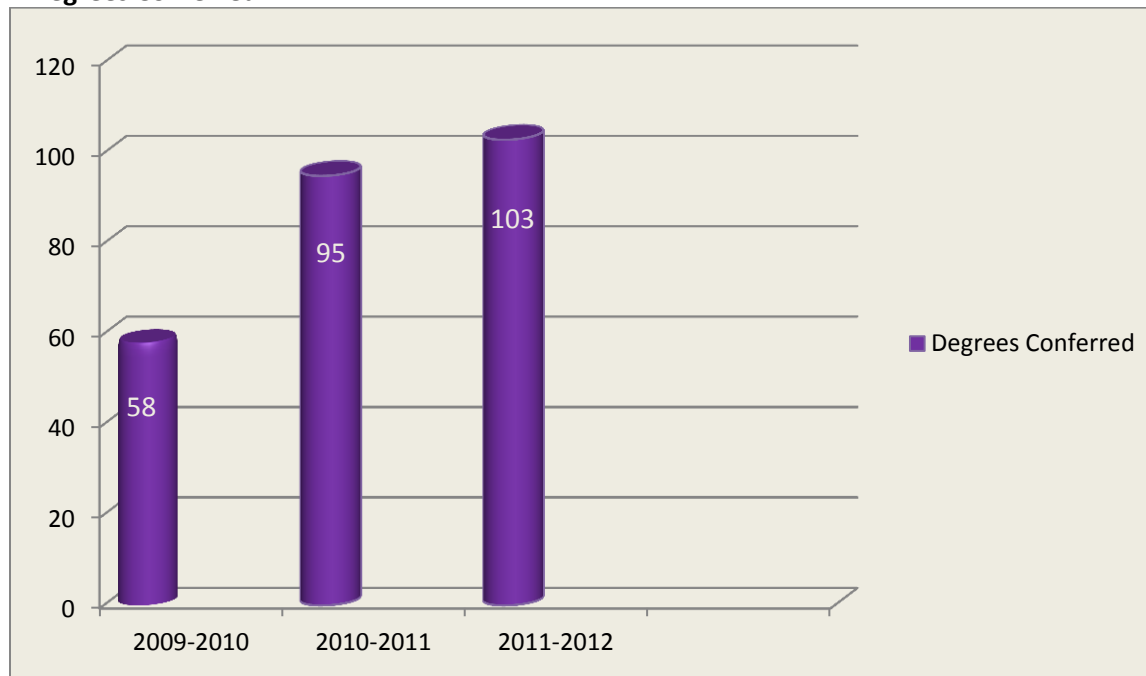
